Now to each one the manifestation of the Spirit is given for the common good. (1 Corinthians 12:7 NIV)



During his life on earth, Jesus was empowered by the Holy Spirit to do ministry. Jesus said that one day Christians would do even greater ministry than he did (John 14:12). While this does not mean that Christians are greater than Jesus, it does mean that Christians who are also gifted and empowered by the Holy Spirit can minister to more people than Jesus did because there are billions of Christians today spread across the earth. Therefore, as we begin our study of spiritual gifts it is paramount that we first see that our personal ministry is the continuation of Jesus' ministry. Or, to summarize, the gifts of God are dispensed through the Spirit of God so that the church of God can minister like the Son of God.

There are four basic positions on spiritual gifts:

Cessationist Supernatural gifts (e.g., tongues and prophecy) functioned only in the early church and are not to be practiced today.
Charismatic Supernatural gifts are given to every generation and should be practiced today according to the limits of Scripture.
Charismaniac Supernatural gifts are given to every generation. Contemporary revelations are, in effect, equal to Scripture.
Pentecostal Essentially the same as the charismatic position, but only Christians who speak in tongues have the Holy Spirit.

Spiritual Gifts Are Often Misunderstood

Now about spiritual gifts, brothers, I do not want you to be ignorant. (<u>1 Cor. 12:1 NIV</u>) Sadly, it seems ignorance about spiritual gifts persists in our day. It is important to clarify some of the most debated aspects of the spiritual gifts.

The spiritual gifts differ from natural talents (e.g., musical ability, creativity, athletic prowess, computer skills) in that one is given at new birth and the other is given at birth.

Since no list of spiritual gifts in the New Testament seems altogether complete, compiling all of the lists together still may not result in a complete list (<u>1 Corinthians 12:8-10</u>; <u>12:28</u>; <u>Romans 12:6-8</u>; <u>Ephesians 4:11</u>; and <u>1 Peter 4:11</u>).

We are each given different portions of a gift.

We must be open to serving outside our area of gifting.

God will also give us passions and opportunities in addition to natural talents and spiritual gifts.

Discovering our gift(s) is related to assessing our desires, joy, and effectiveness.

Every gift must be cultivated so that we are most effective in our ministry service.

What's the Point of Spiritual Gifts?

Spiritual Gifts Serve the Lordship of Jesus

You know that when you were pagans, somehow or other you were influenced and led astray to mute idols. Therefore I tell you that no one who is speaking by the Spirit of God says, "Jesus be cursed," and no one can say, "Jesus is Lord," except by the Holy Spirit. (<u>1 Cor. 12:2-3 NIV</u>) The entire point of ministry and spiritual gifts is to reveal the lordship of Jesus Christ as God over all people and things. Therefore, if someone says they are a Christian or want to do ministry but they do not affirm the lordship of Jesus Christ, they do not have the Holy Spirit. The primary evidence of a person having the Holy Spirit is their love and submission to Jesus.

Spiritual Gifts Are Given by the Trinity

There are different kinds of gifts, but the same Spirit. There are different kinds of service, but the same Lord. There are different kinds of working, but the same God works all of them in all men. (<u>1 Cor. 12:4-6 NIV</u>) Here we see that the entire Trinity is involved in gifting the church for ministry.

Spiritual Gifts Each Exist to Benefit the Whole Church

Now to each one the manifestation of the Spirit is given for the common good. (<u>1 Cor. 12:7 NIV</u>) Whatever someone's gift, the purpose of the gift is to build up and benefit the entire church, not just edify the individual using the gift.

Spiritual Gifts Are Appointed by God

All these are the work of one and the same Spirit, and he gives them to each one, just as he determines. (<u>1 Cor. 12:11 NIV</u>) Spiritual gifts are given by God's choice; we cannot choose our gift. So anyone who is unhappy about how God has designed them is, in effect, complaining about God not giving them the gift they wanted. This is like a spoiled kid unwrapping a present only to complain about it.

Spiritual Gifts: Administration

Now you are the body of Christ, and each one of you is a part of it. And in the church God has appointed first of all apostles, second prophets, third teachers, then workers of miracles, also those having gifts of healing, those able to help others, those with gifts of administration... (<u>1 Corinthians 12:27-28 NIV</u>)

Spiritual Gift of Administration Defined

The gift of administration is the God-given ability to give direction and make decisions on behalf of others that result in efficient operation and accomplishment of goals. Administration includes the ability to organize people, things, information, finances, etc. Often the mark of an administrator is the ability to accomplish things in a "fitting and orderly way" (<u>1 Corinthians14:40</u>).

People with the Gift of Administration

Administrators often have a keen eye for detail. They may also possess the natural talents of organization, observing and using details, problem solving, and reasoning.

Administration in Scripture

Jesus organized His ministry by choosing his inner circle of three disciples (<u>Mark 9:2</u>), appointing the twelve (<u>Mark 3:13-14</u>), and sending out the seventy two by two (<u>Luke 10:1</u>). Joseph (<u>Genesis 41:41-57</u>; <u>47:13-26</u>), Jethro (Exodus 18), and Titus (<u>Titus 1:5</u>) all demonstrate the gift of administration.

Do You Have This Gift?

When things are poorly organized do you get frustrated and want to help fix things?

Can you bring order out of chaos?

Do you naturally organize your life, schedule, finances, priorities, etc.?

Do you become energized working on tasks and projects?

Do things like efficiency and promptness matter more to you than most people?

Do things like spreadsheets, budgets, organizational charts and software, files, highlighters, and label makers make you happy?

Spiritual Gifts: Apostles

Now you are the body of Christ, and each one of you is a part of it. And in the church God has appointed first of all apostles... (<u>1 Corinthians</u> <u>12:27-28 NIV</u>) It was he who gave some to be apostles... (<u>Ephesians 4:11 NIV</u>)

The Spiritual Gift of Apostles Defined

There is much confusion regarding the spiritual gift of apostleship because there is sometimes a failure to distinguish between the office of apostle and the gift of apostle. The office of apostle refers to the twelve chosen by Jesus (e.g., <u>Matthew 10:1</u>; <u>19:28</u>; <u>20:17</u>; <u>Mark 3:13-19</u>; <u>6:7</u>; <u>9:35</u>; <u>10:32</u>; <u>Luke 6:12-16</u>; <u>8:1</u>; <u>9:1</u>; <u>22:19-30</u>; <u>John 6:70-71</u>; <u>Revelation 21:14</u>). The requirements for the office of apostle include being an eyewitness to the life and resurrection of Jesus (<u>Acts 1:21-26</u>). Another requirement is miraculous power (<u>Acts 2:43</u>; <u>5:12</u>; <u>8:18</u>; <u>2 Corinthians 12:12</u>; <u>Hebrews 2:4</u>). Therefore, apostles do not exist today (e.g., writing books of the Bible), although the function of their office does continue in a limited sense.

Apostleship in a Secondary Sense

For example, apostleship in a secondary sense applies to such people as Barnabas (<u>Acts 14:3-4</u>, <u>14</u>), Apollos and Sosthenes (<u>1 Corinthians 4:6-9</u>), Andronicus and Junias (<u>Romans 16:7</u>), James (<u>Galatians 1:19</u>), and Silas and Timothy (<u>1 Thessalonians 1:1</u>; <u>2:6</u>). They, like apostles today, were gifted individuals sent out to move from place to place in order to begin and establish local churches (<u>Acts 13:3-4</u>). This gift also includes the capacity to minister cross-culturally (<u>Acts 10:34-35</u>; <u>Ephesians 3:7-8</u>). Today, church planters and missionaries are operating out of their gift of apostleship as well as those Christian leaders God raises up to lead and influence multiple churches and pastors.

People with the Gift of Apostleship

These people often have a number of gifts, such as evangelism, teaching, leadership, faith, and exhortation and are motivated by difficult new tasks.

Apostles in Scripture

Hebrews 3:1 says, "Therefore, holy brothers, who share in the heavenly calling, fix your thoughts on Jesus, the apostle and high priest whom we confess." Jesus also builds the church (<u>Matthew 16:18</u>; <u>Hebrews 3:1-6</u>). He is the chief cornerstone of the church, upon which the foundation of the prophets and apostles is laid (<u>Ephesians 2:20</u>), and over which He rules as Chief Shepherd (<u>1 Peter 5:4</u>). Paul is another example (Romans, 1 Corinthians, 2 Corinthians, Galatians, Ephesians, Colossians, 1 Timothy, 2 Timothy, and Titus all open with Paul introducing himself as an apostle). Also, a reading of Acts shows how Paul ministered cross-culturally and planted churches. Peter also held the office of apostle (<u>Galatians 2:8</u>; <u>1 Peter 1:1</u>). **Common Errors Regarding Apostles** Cult leaders and erroneous teachers say that they have authority that is, in effect, equal to Scripture because they are apostles just like those who wrote the Bible. But such people are false apostles (<u>2 Corinthians 11:13</u>; <u>Revelation 2:2</u>) and delusional "super-apostles" (<u>2 Corinthians 11:5</u>, <u>13</u>; <u>12:11</u>). **Do You Have This Gift?**

- Can you effectively minister cross-culturally?
- Are you called and qualified to plant a church?
- Can you start a church from nothing?
- Are you an entrepreneur?
- Has God given you leadership and influence over multiple churches as a movement leader?
- Can you pioneer a ministry where others have failed?

Spiritual Gifts: Discernment

(<u>1 Cor. 12:8-10 NIV</u>)

What Is the Spiritual Gift of Discernment?

The spiritual gift of discernment is the ability to quickly perceive whether such things as people, events, or beliefs are from God or Satan. People with the gift of discernment know that Satan and his demons disguise themselves as holy (<u>1 Cor. 11:14-15</u>). They also know that Satan empowers counterfeit miracles (<u>Ex. 7:11-22</u>; <u>8:7</u>; <u>Matt. 7:21-23</u>; <u>2 Tim. 3:8</u>) to deceive people (<u>2 Thess. 2:9</u>), and that he empowers false teachers (<u>2 Pet. 2:1</u>), false prophets (<u>Matt. 7:15</u>), false apostles (<u>2 Cor. 11:13</u>), and false doctrines (<u>1 Tim. 1:3</u>; <u>6:3</u>).

Discernment in Scripture

Jesus was able to know the presence of Satan (<u>Matt. 4:1-11</u>), see when someone was influenced by Satan (<u>Luke 22:31</u>), and know when someone's words were influenced by Satan (<u>Matt. 16:23</u>). John (<u>1 John 4:1</u>), Paul (<u>Acts 16:16-18</u>), Peter (<u>Acts 5:1-11</u>), and the disciples (<u>Matt. 10:1</u>) all demonstrated the gift of discernment.

Do You Have This Gift?

Have you felt a special responsibility to protect the truth of God's Word by exposing that which is wrong?

Do you often make a swift evaluation of someone or something that was said, that others did not see but yet proved to be correct?

Do you have a solid understanding of Scripture and a sensitivity to the leading of God the Holy Spirit?

Are you keenly aware of moral sin and doctrinal heresy?

Can you read a book or hear a teacher and almost immediately uncover any false teaching?

Do you have an awareness of demonic presence and how to help people be free of demons?

Spiritual Gifts: Encouragement

Spiritual Gift of Encouragement Defined

The gift of encouragement (also called the gift of exhortation) involves motivating, encouraging, and consoling others so they mature in their walk with Jesus.

People with the Gift of Encouragement

Christians with this gift have an unusual sensitivity for and are attracted to those who are discouraged or struggling. As a result, people tend to pursue them for healing words, gracious truth, and compassionate counsel. These people also tend to have a high degree of patience and optimism. They may have a knack for one-on-one relationships and prefer working with an individual or small group.

Encouragement in Scripture

Jesus told us to love even our enemies and do good to them (<u>Luke 6:27-35</u>), and exhorted people to "leave your life of sin" (<u>John</u> 8:11). Barnabas, whose name means "Son of Encouragement" (<u>Acts 4:36</u>), encouraged Paul (<u>Acts 9:27</u>) and John Mark (<u>Acts 15:39</u>). Paul had this gift (<u>Acts 14:21-22</u>; <u>16:40</u>; <u>20:1</u>) as did Judas and Silas (<u>Acts 15:31-32</u>).

Do You Have This Gift?

Do people seek you out for advice and encouragement?

Do you enjoy walking with someone through difficulties?

Are you attracted to those who are hurting and needy?

Are you patient with people?

Would you rather speak personally with someone about their problems rather than send them to someone else for help?

Do you find it easy to express joy in the presence of those who are suffering?

Spiritual Gifts: Evangelism

It was he who gave some to be apostles, some to be prophets, some to be evangelists... (Ephesians 4:11 NIV)

Spiritual Gift of Evangelism Defined

The gift of evangelism is the ability and desire to boldly and clearly communicate the gospel of Jesus Christ so that non-Christians can become Christians.

People with the Gift of Evangelism

Evangelists often care passionately about lost people and have a strong desire to see them meet Jesus. They feel compassion for the lost and seek to earnestly understand their questions and doubts so that they can provide a compelling answer. An evangelist often prefers being with people in the culture rather than hanging out with Christians in the church.

Evangelism in Scripture

<u>Luke 19:10</u> says that "the Son of Man came to seek and to save what was lost." People accused Jesus of being "a friend of tax collectors and 'sinners'" because he had many evangelistic relationships with sinful people (<u>Matthew 11:19</u>). Philip (<u>Acts 21:8</u>) and Timothy (<u>2 Timothy 4:5</u>) are also examples of evangelists.

Do You Have This Gift?

Do you enjoy being with non-Christians and sharing the gospel? Are you able to effectively communicate to non-Christians in a language they can understand? Does a person's conversion bring you profound joy? Do you feel frustrated when you haven't shared your faith for a while?

Do you enjoy teaching others how to share their faith?

Do you find it easy to direct a conversation toward the topic of Jesus Christ?

Spiritual Gifts: Faith

The Spiritual Gift of Faith Defined

The gift of faith is the ability to envision what needs to be done and to trust God to accomplish it even though it seems impossible to most people.

People with the Gift of Faith

Those with the gift of faith trust God in difficult, even impossible situations when others are ready to give up. These people are often visionaries who dream big dreams, pray big prayers, and attempt big things for Jesus. These people tend to be optimistic, hopeful, persevering, change-oriented, and future-focused. These people also tend to be very convincing about the truth of Scripture because they themselves are so convinced of the truth and power of God and his Word.

Faith in Scripture

In one sense, Jesus' entire life and ministry could be summarized as one of faith because he continually and perfectly trusted in God the Father in all things. Faith is also illustrated in the lives of Paul (<u>Acts 27:21-25</u>), Stephen, who was "full of faith" (<u>Acts 6:5</u>), and Jesus' mother, Mary, who trusted God to give her a child though she was a virgin (<u>Luke 1:26-38</u>). Hebrews 11 also lists a great number of Christians who had the gift of faith.

Do You Have This Gift?

Here are some questions to ask yourself:

Do you view obstacles as opportunities and trust God for the impossible?

Do you find yourself frequently boasting about the power of God and what you have seen him do?

Do you get motivated by new ministries?

Do you find yourself feeling opposed to anyone who expresses that something cannot be done or accomplished?

Do you find other believers coming to you for hope when they face a seemingly overwhelming trial or task?

Do you have an effective prayer ministry, with many wonderful answers to prayers that were impossible from the human point of view?

Spiritual Gifts: Giving

We have different gifts, according to the grace given us. If a man's gift is prophesying, let him use it in proportion to his faith. If it is serving, let him serve; if it is teaching, let him teach; if it is encouraging, let him encourage; if it is contributing to the needs of others, let him give generously... (Romans 12:6-8 NIV)

Spiritual Gift of Giving Defined

The gift of giving is the ability to give money and other forms of wealth joyfully, wisely, and generously to meet the needs of others and help support ministries.

People with the Gift of Giving

Regardless of the amount, people with this gift genuinely view their treasures, talents, and time as on loan from God and not their own. They are often moved to meet the physical needs of others. They enjoy giving of themselves and what they have. Even if they do not possess the resources to help, they earnestly pray for those needs to be met.

Giving in Scripture

Roughly 25 percent of Jesus' words in the Gospels are related to our resources and stewardship of them. Though he was poor, Jesus not only fed thousands (<u>Mark 6:41</u>) but also gave us his life as a gift (<u>John 15:13</u>). Elsewhere in the Bible, the widow (<u>Mark 12:42-43</u>), Tabitha (<u>Acts 9:36</u>), Barnabas (<u>Acts 4:34-37</u>), and the Macedonian church (<u>2 Cor. 8:1-2</u>) all had this gift.

Do You Have This Gift?

Do you tend to see the needs of others more than other people do?

Do you enjoy giving your time, talent, and treasure to others?

Do you see giving to a worthwhile project as an exciting honor and privilege?

Do you give to the church regularly, cheerfully, and sacrificially?

Do you often hear people commenting that you are a generous person?

Do you find yourself looking for opportunities to give your money-even when no one asks?

Spiritual Gifts: Healing

To one there is given through the Spirit the message of wisdom, to another the message of knowledge by means of the same Spirit, to another faith by the same Spirit, to another gifts of healing by that one Spirit... (<u>1 Cor. 12:8-9 NIV</u>) These gifts are inextricably connected to the freedom of God. When it comes to such things as healings and miracles, some people like to say that God must heal them, whereas others say that God, in effect, cannot do miraculous things anymore. These people are either saying that God must do something or that God cannot do something. Both of these positions should be rejected, because God is free to do as he sees fit.

The Spiritual Gift of Healing Defined

The gift of healing is the ability to call on God to heal the sick through supernatural means for the purpose of revealing God.

People with the Gift of Healing

Those with the gift of healing trust that God can heal the sick and pray in faith for the physical restoration of those in need. These people see healing as a sign that God uses to reveal his power to people so that many will come to believe in Jesus. People with this gift do not see someone healed every time they ask God, since healing is something that God alone decides to do (e.g., <u>Gal. 4:13-14; Phil. 2:27; 1 Tim. 5:23; 2 Tim. 4:20</u>).

Healing in Scripture

<u>Matthew 4:23-24</u> and <u>9:35</u> speak of Jesus' many healings. The Twelve had the gift of healing (<u>Matt. 10:1</u>), as did the Seventy (<u>Luke 10:8-9</u>), Peter (<u>Acts 5:14-16</u>), and Paul (<u>Acts 3:1-8</u>). Additionally, church elders are supposed to pray for the sick so that God might heal them (<u>James 5:13-16</u>).

Common Errors Regarding Healing

Some say that the more supernatural gifts, such as healing, ceased to operate at the end of the first century, but the church fathers from the second and third century report that such things as healing continued to occur in their day.

Some say that if a testimony of a healing is given, it is to be believed, but a healing also needs to be verified (e.g., by a doctor) to help prove what God has done.

Some say that healing should be done in a church service, but there is no record of this happening in the New Testament, which may mean that healing, like some other gifts, is not best used during a church service.

Some extreme groups teach that since God can heal, Christians should not use a doctor, but the Bible does not speak against doctors, and doctors like Luke used their medical ability as part of their pastoral ministry to help people (<u>Col. 4:14; 2 Tim. 4:11; Philem. 1:24</u>).

Some say that by walking in faith and not sinning, no Christian needs to ever be sick, but Epaphroditus (<u>Phil. 2:25-27</u>), Timothy (<u>1 Tim. 5:23</u>), Trophimus (<u>2 Tim. 4:20</u>), and Paul (<u>1 Cor. 2:3</u>; <u>2 Cor. 11:30</u>; <u>12:5</u>, <u>7-10</u>; <u>Gal. 4:13</u>) each had sickness that was not healed, despite the fact they deeply loved God and walked with Jesus faithfully.

Do You Have This Gift?

Do you have a deep compassion for people who are sick?

Do you have a deep conviction that God can heal anyone he chooses?

Do you enjoy praying for people who are sick?

Have you seen God heal someone?

When God heals someone, are you excited because it helps to reveal his power to others?

Do you long for the coming of God's kingdom, when there will be an end to all sickness since sin and its effects will be no more?

Spiritual Gifts: Helps/Service

And in the church God has appointed first of all apostles, second prophets, third teachers, then workers of miracles, also those having gifts of healing, those able to help others... (<u>1 Corinthians 12:27-28 NIV</u>) If it is serving, let him serve... (<u>Romans 12:7 NIV</u>)

The Spiritual Gift of Helps/Service Defined

The gift of helps/service is the ability to joyfully work alongside another and help that person complete the task God has given them. People with this gift generally prefer to work behind the scenes. They also tend to find joy in helping alleviate the burdens and responsibilities of others. This gift is usually accompanied with an attitude of humility and sacrifice, as well as an ability to perceive the needs of others.

People with the Gift of Helps/Service

These people tend to demonstrate a servant attitude, loyalty, attention to detail, and responsiveness to the initiatives of others. They function well in positions of detail and assistant leadership.

Helps/Service in Scripture

Matthew 20:28 says that "the Son of Man [Jesus] did not come to be served, but to serve, and to give his life as a ransom for many." Jesus also said, "I am among you as one who serves," and He even washed His disciples' feet (Luke 22:27; John 13:5). Because servants often work behind the scenes, their work but not their name is often mentioned in Scripture (e.g., Numbers 11:17; 1 Timothy 6:2; Acts 6:1-3). People named in the Bible who helped the church through service include Phoebe, Priscilla, Aquila, Tryphena, Tryphosa (Romans 16:1-4, 12), and John Mark (Acts 13:5). Some people with this gift are also appointed to leadership as church deacons (1 Timothy 3:8-13).

Do You Have This Gift?

Do you enjoy helping others become more effective in their work?

Do you prefer to labor behind the scenes?

When someone is doing a job poorly is your first instinct to help them instead of criticize?

Do you prefer to work in a supportive rather than a leadership capacity?

When you hear of someone with needs, do you offer your services if possible?

When someone asks for your help, do you have difficulty saying no?

Spiritual Gifts: Hospitality

Share with God's people who are in need. Practice hospitality. (Romans 12:13 NIV)

Spiritual Gift of Hospitality Defined

The spiritual gift of hospitality is the ability to welcome strangers and entertain guests, often in your home, with great joy and kindness so that they become friends. Hospitality is supposed to include one's family (<u>1 Tim. 5:8</u>), friends (<u>Prov. 27:10</u>), Christians (<u>Gal. 6:10</u>), and strangers who may not be Christians (<u>Lev. 19:34</u>).

People with the Gift of Hospitality

These people tend to have an "open home" where others are welcome to visit. This gift is often combined with the natural talents of interior design, cooking, and event planning. Importantly, hospitality is NOT to be extended to false teachers and the like, who are a danger (<u>2 John 10-11</u>).

Hospitality in Scripture

Jesus spent time befriending social outcasts (<u>Matt. 11:19</u>), often ate with His disciples, and has welcomed us into the family of God, which includes an eternal home (<u>John 14:2</u>) and an eternal party (<u>Isa. 25:6-9</u>; <u>Rev. 19:6-9</u>). Elders and pastors are commanded to exercise hospitality (<u>1 Tim. 3:2</u>; <u>Titus 1:8</u>). Peter enjoyed the hospitality of Simon (<u>Acts 9:43</u>) and Cornelius (<u>Acts 10:48</u>). Paul enjoyed the hospitality of Lydia (<u>Acts 16:15</u>) and the Philippian jailer (<u>Acts 16:34</u>).

The Spiritual Gift of Knowledge Defined

The word of knowledge is the ability to research, remember, and make effective use of a variety of information on a number of diverse subjects.

People with the Gift of Knowledge

These people love to study, love to learn, and are not content with a surface-level knowledge of topics. They are compelled to conduct thorough research and compile their findings so that others can benefit from their long hours of focused study. People with this spiritual gift love God with all their mind (<u>Mark 12:29-30</u>). And these people tend to like footnotes.

Knowledge in Jesus' Ministry

Throughout his ministry, Jesus frequently quoted the Old Testament Scriptures from memory because he had committed himself to studying Scripture so faithfully. Jesus also rebuked the scholars of his day because they studied the Bible but failed to love him, which is the purpose of all study (John 5:39). Knowledge is illustrated in the lives of Ezra (Ezra 7:10), Solomon (Ecclesiastes 1:13; 7:25; 8:9), and Timothy (2 Timothy 2:15).

Do You Have This Gift?

Here are some questions to ask yourself:

Do you love to study?

Do you have a good memory that retains and compiles lots of information?

Have others frequently pointed out your ability to know and understand God's Word?

Do people often come to you with difficult problems and questions from the Bible, seeking your insight because they know you will have the answer or find it?

In studying God's Word, have you found that new insights and understanding of difficult subjects come easy to you?

Are you frustrated when you hear bad teaching from someone who has not done their homework?

Spiritual Gifts: Leadership

Spiritual Gift of Leadership Defined

The spiritual gift of leadership is found in people who have a clear, significant vision from God and are able to communicate it publicly or privately in such a way that they influence others to pursue that vision.

People with the Gift of Leadership

These people tend to gravitate toward the "point position" in a ministry. Others tend to have trust and confidence in their abilities. They best serve others by leading them. They tend to operate with a strong sense of destiny.

Leadership in Scripture

Jesus was such a gifted leader that in His day thousands followed Him and today billions follow Him as the greatest leader who has ever lived. Other examples abound, including Abraham, Moses, Joshua, David, Daniel, Josiah, Paul, Peter, and James.

Do You Have This Gift?

Do others have confidence in your ability to lead?

Do you enjoy being the "final voice" or the one with the overall responsibility for the direction and success of a group or organization?

When a difficult situation arises, do others look to you for input and leadership?

Do you usually take leadership in a group where none exists?

Do you find leadership enjoyable rather than frustrating and difficult?

Do others look to you to make the major decisions for a group or organization?

Spiritual Gifts: Mercy

Spiritual Gift of Mercy Defined

The gift of mercy is the capacity to feel and express unusual compassion and sympathy for those in difficult or crisis situations and provide them with the necessary help and support to see them through tough times.

People with the Gift of Mercy

They have the ability to "walk in another's shoes" and to feel the pain and burdens they carry. They desire to make a difference in the lives of hurting people without being judgmental. They may have a difficult time evaluating the intentions of others and at times appear naïve.

Mercy in Scripture

Jesus taught on mercy (<u>Matt. 5:7</u>; <u>9:13</u>; <u>23:23</u>). He is repeatedly described as having compassion (<u>Matt. 9:36</u>; <u>15:32</u>; <u>23:37</u>; <u>Luke</u> <u>7:13</u>) and was so filled with mercy that He sometimes wept (<u>John 11:35</u>). Jesus' mercy included an attentiveness to and concern for children (<u>Matt. 19:14</u>). Dorcas "was always doing good and helping the poor" (<u>Acts 9:36</u>). Also, the good Samaritan is one of the most classic stories ever told on the subject of mercy (<u>Luke 10:30-37</u>).

Do You Have This Gift?

Do you find yourself being drawn to people who are needy, hurting, sick, disabled, or elderly?

Do you often think of ways to minister to those who are suffering?

Do you sense a great deal of compassion for people having personal and emotional problems?

Do you find that when you visit those who are suffering it brings you joy rather than depressing you?

Do you find yourself responding to people more out of compassion than judgment?

Spiritual Gifts: Miracles

Continued from: <u>Part 6</u> To one there is given through the Spirit the message of wisdom, to another the message of knowledge by means of the same Spirit, to another faith by the same Spirit, to another gifts of healing by that one Spirit, to another miraculous powers, to another prophecy, to another distinguishing between spirits, to another speaking in different kinds of tongues, and to still another the interpretation of tongues. (<u>1 Cor. 12:8-10 NIV</u>)

What Is the Spiritual Gift of Miracles?

The gift of miracles is the ability to call on God to do supernatural acts that reveal his power. People with the gift of miracles see God show up in extraordinary ways, from daily little events to major public displays. Examples from the Bible include demons being cast out of people, nature obeying God's authority, and the dead being raised. Obviously, these sorts of things are uncommon and do not happen regularly—otherwise they would not be viewed as miraculous. People with this gift do not chase signs and wonders, but they do expect signs and wonders to follow God's people who follow Jesus.

Miracles in Scripture

Acts 2:22 says Jesus performed many miracles, and John 20:20-31 says that Jesus' many miracles were to prove he was God. Jesus commanded nature (Mark 4:35-41), cast out demons (Mark 5:1-13; Matt. 12: 22), walked on water (Mark 6:45-51), turned water into wine (John 2:1-11), and fed over 5,000 people with one boy's lunch (John 6:1-14). The apostles did "many miraculous signs" (Acts 2:43), Stephen did "great" miracles (Acts 6:8), and Paul did "extraordinary" miracles at Ephesus (Acts 19:11). Also, Paul cast out demons (Acts 16:16-18), God blinded a sorcerer for Paul (Acts 13:6-12), and there were many miracles surrounding the ministries of Moses, Elijah, and Elisha.

Common Errors Regarding Miracles

Some people who claim to have this gift use it to exalt themselves, but the gift exists to exalt God and spread the name of Jesus.

Some say that the most godly people will have this gift, but even John the Baptizer never performed a miracle (John 10:41).

Some Christians are prone to chase signs and wonders, but Jesus said that it is a wicked and evil thing to seek a sign (Luke 11:29).

Some people think that a sign or miracle is guaranteed to prove to a non-Christian that Jesus is real, but Jesus said that some people would never believe in him even if they saw a miracle (John 4:48).

Do You Have This Gift?

Do you truly believe that God can do the impossible?

When you read of the many miracles in the Bible, are you encouraged because you love to see God made known in ways that cannot be ignored?

Have you seen someone freed from demonic oppression?

Have you seen God perform miracles?

When you hear of or see miracles, is your faith in God greatly increased?

Do you use stories of God's miracles to help prove to others that Jesus is God?

Spiritual Gifts: Pastor/Biblical Counseling

It was he who gave some to be apostles, some to be prophets, some to be evangelists, and some to be pastors and teachers... (Ephesians 4:11 NIV)

Spiritual Gift of Pastor/Biblical Counseling Defined

In one sense, pastoring is the office reserved for those men who meet the biblical criteria (<u>1 Timothy 3:1-7</u>; <u>Titus 1:5-9</u>). In another sense, there is a pastoral gift also commonly known as shepherding or biblical counseling that God gives to people in the church beyond the pastors/elders. These people protect, guide, counsel, and disciple other people.

People with the Gift of Pastor/Biblical Counseling

The person with a pastoral gifting has a love for people that compels them to meet with people to care for them and guide them with biblical instruction. People with this gift find great joy in seeing people mature in their faith and overcome besetting sin and discouragement.

Pastor/Biblical Counseling in Scripture

Jesus is called the "Good Shepherd" (John 10:11-14; 13:20; <u>1 Peter 2:25</u>) and the "Chief Shepherd" (<u>1 Peter 5:4</u>). Also, the Bible gives us snapshots of Jesus sitting with people to pastor them, such as his interaction with the Samaritan woman at the well in John 4. Paul is another example of a pastor or biblical counselor (<u>Acts 20:17-35</u>).

Do you have this gift?

Do you have a deep love for people that compels you to care for them?

Do you enjoy meeting with people to listen to their life story and provide them biblical counsel?

When you hear that someone is hurting is your first instinct to try and meet with them to be of help?

Are you able to point out sin and folly in someone's life in a loving way that they receive as helpful?

Do you enjoy meeting with Christians to help them mature in their faith?

Do people pursue you for counsel and instruction?

Spiritual Gifts: Teaching

Now you are the body of Christ, and each one of you is a part of it. And in the church God has appointed first of all apostles, second prophets, third teachers... (<u>1 Corinthians 12:27-28 NIV</u>) If it is serving, let him serve; if it is teaching, let him teach... (<u>Romans 12:7 NIV</u>)

The Spiritual Gift of Teaching Defined

The gift of teaching is the God-given ability to understand and communicate biblical truth in a clear and relevant manner so that there is understanding and application.

People with the Gift of Teaching

Learning, researching, communicating, and illustrating truth are qualities that an individual will manifest when exercising the gift of teaching. These people enjoy studying and learning new information, and find great joy in sharing it with others. The format of teaching varies from one-on-one discipleship to formal classes, informal Bible studies, large groups, and preaching, which is a form of teaching.

Teaching in Jesus' Ministry

Throughout the gospels, Jesus was commonly referred to as *Rabbi*, which means "teacher." <u>Matthew 4:23</u> says that "Jesus went throughout Galilee, teaching," and <u>Matthew 7:28-29</u> says that "the crowds were amazed at his [Jesus'] teaching because he taught as one who had authority, and not as their teachers of the law."

Teaching in Scripture

Aquila and Priscilla (<u>Acts 18:26</u>), Paul (<u>Acts 19:8-10</u>; 20:20; <u>Colossians 1:28</u>; <u>1 Timothy 2:7</u>), elders/pastors (<u>1 Timothy 3:2</u>; <u>5:17</u>), Timothy (<u>1 Timothy 4:11,13</u>; <u>6:2</u>), and godly women (<u>Titus 2:2-4</u>) all demonstrated the gift of teaching.

Do You Have This Gift?

Do you enjoy studying and researching?

Do you enjoy imparting biblical truth to others?

Do others come to you for insight into Scripture?

When you teach, do people "get it"?

When you see someone confused in their understanding of the Bible do you feel a responsibility to speak to them about it?

Do you enjoy speaking to various sizes of groups about biblical issues you have strong convictions about?

Spiritual Gifts: Wisdom

Having laid some foundational principles regarding spiritual gifts, Paul begins to list some of the spiritual gifts: "*To one there is given through the Spirit the message of wisdom, to another the message of knowledge by means of the same Spirit.*" (<u>1 Cor. 12:8</u> <u>NIV</u>)

The Spiritual Gift of Wisdom Defined

The gift of wisdom is the ability to have insight into people and situations that is not obvious to the average person, combined with an understanding of what to do and how to do it. It is the ability to not only see, but also apply the principles of God's Word to the practical matters of life by the "Spirit of wisdom" (Eph. 1:17).

People with the Gift of Wisdom

These people often have an ability to synthesize biblical truth and apply it to people's lives so that they make good choices and avoid foolish mistakes. These people today function well as coaches, counselors, and consultants.

Wisdom in Jesus' Ministry

Luke 2:40-52 says that Jesus was "filled with wisdom" as a boy and "grew in wisdom" as a young man so that the scholars of his day were "amazed at his understanding." Crowds who heard Jesus teach said, "What's this wisdom that has been given him?" (Mark 6:2). In Matthew 12:42, Jesus said that he was wiser than Solomon. And in Luke 21:15, Jesus said, "I will give you words and wisdom." We are also told that Jesus is the "wisdom of God" (1 Cor. 1:24, 30). Wisdom is also illustrated in the lives of Joshua (Deut. 34:9), Solomon (1 Kings 3:5-28), and Daniel (Daniel 1:17-20; 2:19-23).

Do You Have This Gift?

Here are some questions to ask yourself:

When studying God's Word, do you find that you discover the meaning and its implications before others do?

Do you seem to understand things about God's Word that other believers with the same background and experience don't seem to know?

Are you able to apply biblical truth in a practical way to help counsel others to make good life choices?

Do you get frustrated when people make foolish decisions that damage their quality of life, because you know what they should have done instead?

Do you find that when people have important decisions to make, they come to you for prayer and biblical counsel?

Do you find that when you counsel people, God the Spirit gives you wisdom to share with them from Scripture, which they accept as God's truth to them through you?
